As we count the blessings of family, health, work, and the privilege of living in our great country, I hope we will remember to offer thanks to our men and women serving with honor in dangerous places around the world to safeguard what we hold most dear.

People of good conscience can find themselves on opposite sides of the ongoing debate on the necessity, wisdom or purpose of the current military action in Iraq. Such a debate is ultimately healthy for our democracy, however unpleasant or divisive the process may appear while we are actively engage in it.

Holidays are an especially difficult time for our troops. They need to know that they are not forgotten, and need tangible reminders of their nation's appreciation for their faithful service and self-sacrifice. As you plan your holiday parties and enjoy the ritual of shopping for holiday gifts for friends and loved ones, please consider writing a letter or sending a care package to a member of our armed forces in harm's way.

Visit your local post office and ask about their current effort to send prepaid phone cards to our troops. A \$10 donation buys a phone card that soldiers can use to contact their families, which the U.S. Postal Service ships to troops in the field free of charge. You can also visit http://anysoldier.com to find out how to send letters or care packages to specific soldiers in harm's way who would like to hear from you.
